Spruce/Justin Park We purchased Ariens Deluxe 28 so our writer could put it to the test. Keep reading for our full product review. The Wisconsin-based Ariens brand, which advertises itself as the King of Snow, has been producing snowblowers, tractors and other outdoor equipment since 1933. To see how accurate their self-proclaimed name was, we raised the Ariens Deluxe 28 and put it to work plowing heavy early-season snowfall at our home high up in the Colorado Rockies. Keep reading to see how the snowblower is performed on our medium length, steep road. Delivery of Ariens Deluxe was not as easy as getting a package from FedEx or UPS. Instead, we got a call from a regional delivery company to schedule a full-day delivery window during which we had to be home. Luckily the driver called us to let us know when he was close. Unfortunately, however, the driver was unable to bring his big truck up to our driveway and he had to leave a very large box at the bottom of our drive. Since the snowplow comes partially assembled, this meant bringing our toolbox to the end of the road to finish assembling snowblowers and fill it with gas in order to drive it to our garage (it comes with oil already in the engine). While a full build would be much worse, it's not the most convenient process, so you might want to consider visiting your local big hardware store to see if they pre-assembled it. Spruce/Justin Park Ariens Deluxe 28 is a large-capacity, gas-fueled, two-speed snow blower. This means it comes with powered wheels (you don't have to push it) and an auger-driven snowplow. Smaller (and cheaper) single-stage units are not designed for more than a few inches of snow on paved areas or decks, so if you're dealing with regular winter storms, you'll probably be shopping for models like Ariens. Our home is located 10,000 feet above sea level near the continental watershed in the Rocky Mountains, so we tend to get over 300 inches of snow each year. The snow season is long and consistent, so keeping up with snow removal is vital in maintaining a safe road. While it doesn't snow every day when storms do hit they can leave your feet or thicker snow. Snowpack peaks in early April here, and while our road isn't huge - it's about 1,500 square feet and 50 feet long, we need to throw snow farther and higher every storm until the melt finally starts in late spring. The whole concept of snow-hunting is to throw snow off your road, so you don't have to change your own truck or hire a contractor to plow. Plowing can damage your road and leave piles of debris and gravel that you have to deal with come spring. In addition, small driveways with limited space and plenty of snow can be tricky as you quickly run out of places to fold the plowed snow. Snow blowers make much better snow distribution thanks to their ability to throw it further and in different places along the blower route. The Spruce/Justin Park Ariens Deluxe 28 is equipped with a rotating chute (controlled by a rotating crank shaft handle) that spews snow up to 50 feet. You have to reach a bit to get to the handle to turn the gutter, but you can control the angle of the top of the gutter through the lever on the control board. Note on the control board: this was a source of mild disappointment for us. We're not sure what the designers thought when they put it down, as the gutter rotator is the most frequently adjusted control, but it is on the left side of the machine, so you have to reach through the control board for it, since your right hand is your free hand while running the machine. It can be hard to imagine if you haven't used a two-stage blower before, but basically, you're running a transmission/wheel with a left lever and an air blower with your right hand lever. If you engage in both actively rolling and blowing, the right lever will block as long as you keep the left lever engaged so you can use your right hand to adjust the other controls non-stop. Thus, having other controls on the left doesn't make sense. This does not make the machine unusable and you will learn how to achieve after several applications, it just causes some head scratching and mild irritation. Also, coverage seems unnecessary, since we used cheaper blowers that have the same tilt and rotation of the gutter integrated into one control, which makes adjustments faster and intuitive. Despite our design claims, Ariens Deluxe throws snow and does it quickly. The snow blower runs on gas, but the 120-volt electric start button ensures that the device starts quickly, no matter how cold. After an average-sized storm of, say, 5 inches of new snow, it took us about an hour to completely clear our road, and it's with great attention to detail. Doing the same job with our slightly smaller two-stage Troy-Bilt blower took us about 20 minutes longer, and that unit failed to throw snow as far as it has a 40-foot throwing distance compared to the Ariens' 50-foot maximum. Spruce/Justin Park's combination of decent horsepower and a muscular, well-designed auger system made this unit satisfying for snow removal with. Even after big storms, when we'd slam the auger in 12 or more inches of snow, it wouldn't bog down if the snow was heavily compacted. The same goes for tempered drifted snow, Auger usually managed to chop up chunks of thick snow and spit it out. It is also worth noting that the auger axis is equipped with two haircut bolts. In case something strongly binds the auger, they are designed to snap before any damage is done to the mechanics. A combination of decent horsepower and sturdy, well Auger system made this unit satisfying for snow removal with. Since we chop wood in our road, we certainly suck a significant piece of wood that is associated with auger auger We were relieved to see that the device was just off at this point without a haircut bolt. We were then able to remove the wood from the engine and quickly resume blowing. Our previous blower used weak haircut pins and as a result, we spent a few minutes each session replacing the pins after seemingly minor conflicts with debris and even hard snow. Shire pins are almost standard function on blowers in this class, so it was a relief to have an antenatal unit (and backup haircut bolts mounted on a blower) so we don't have to walk on eggshells with it. The device is loud, like most snow blowers, as you stand over the internal combustion engine without silencers. We found it a little louder than our old, smaller blower, but not at the deafening level of a large chainsaw, for example. When used for long periods of time, hearing protection is definitely recommended. One of the non-standard features that we value with this model is the built-in halogen headlight. We try to make the most of our snow blowing in the morning, but sometimes you come home to the wind in the driveway and have no choice but to work after dark. The headlight is not massive, but it is bright enough to see what you are doing, allowing us to safely blow the snow at night. One of the non-standard features that we value with this model is the built-in halogen headlight. While a good idea, the auto-turning feature is that we are pretty agnostic at after months of testing. Here's how it seems to work and why Ariens included it: Since snow blowers only use two wheels on a fixed axis, you usually have to use some muscle to get the machine to turn. This device, on the other hand, tries to feel when you turn and it uses a differential to stop the inner wheel from turning while the outer wheel still motors, helping your queue. In ideal conditions, when freshly fallen snow is evenly distributed along the level surface- the function works perfectly. We hardly need a muscle unit around, which was a major weigh-in because it weighs more than us at 250 pounds. Snow blowing doesn't always represent ideal conditions, however. Spruce/Justin Park Sometimes someone drives through the snow before you get a chance to blow it up or the drift area and, left unattended, they harden and create uneven snow. In situations like this, when a snowblower hits a hard patch on one side, but not on the other, the auto-turning function can trigger and push the device in a direction you didn't intend. Pushing that requires a lot of effort, and if you don't fix it, it can lead to a situation where the auto-turn is quickly engaged and disconnected, which can the snow blower is pretty wild. While a good idea, the auto-turning feature is that we are pretty agnostic at after months of testing. Auto-turning fads are exacerbated by tilts and compounded even more when the snow-eater is out of balance. The front of the device is also quite lightweight, which seems like a good thing until you notice that it tends to tip to the operator. This is obviously a well-known issue because Ariens actually sells a 10-pound add-on weight kit to combat the imbalance. It's unclear why Ariens didn't just make this part of the plant unit instead of leaving users to discover the problem of balance, research solutions, and spend an additional \$60 to install the add-ons themselves. Ariens Deluxe 28 costs \$1,200. While this is definitely an investment, it is comparable to other brand names of snow blowers that come with similar features. If you need power, this block is worth it, despite a few small quirks. If you don't think you need capacity, Ariens and other manufacturers offer smaller two-step units for less money. While the Deluxe 28 is a great snow blower, it may be redundant for some residential applications. If your road is flat and you don't get a lot of double-digit snow dumps, the Classic 24 offers you the same all-steel Ariens quality for \$400 less. You will lose some cleaning capacity and a few inches from the tires, but if your road is not steep or subject to regular heavy snow, it should be able to cope with what Mother Nature throws at you. It's also about 40 pounds lighter and can be easier to argue with for smaller users. Final verdict If you have a lot of area to clean, buy it. Despite a few small quirks (which can be corrected), the Ariens Deluxe 28 is a solid rock, high-capacity snow blower from a highly reputable company. If your winters deliver big snow, it's just the machine you need. Have to. ariens st1032 carburetor adjustment
